The animal continues to suffer tremendously. Vets can do nothing for her because this is literally a biomedical attack, not an allergy, rash, or other "normal" disease process. She's been suffering off and on for years, but this year, it's been terrible with her crying out in pain, sometimes suddenly in the middle of the night, her ears hot and red and bleeding. I've had the same type of injuries on my face and hands, and sudden attacks - and can show photographic evidence of this, as well as frequency-tracer evidence of high frequency signals coming out of specific parts of my body. Visible injuries - rashes, burns, even cuts and lesions - appear suddenly within minutes, seemingly out of thin air. For this reason, and others, I have reason to believe this is related to piezo-electrical implants and biomedical weapons. That means that biomedical researchers have the ability to assist.

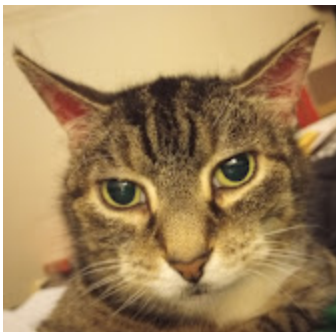

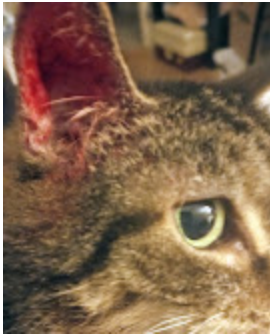
